- + Welcome to the Episcopal Church. The mission of the Episcopal Church, as stated in our Book of Common Prayer, is "to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ." We seek to follow Jesus in loving and life-giving relationships with God, with one another, with all people, and with all God's creation. Our worship, beliefs and practices are diverse and reflect influences from Roman Catholic, Protestant and Orthodox traditions as well as on going reflection and prayer about what it means to believe in and follow Jesus Christ in a rapidly changing world. We Episcopalians are also known as Anglicans, part of the worldwide Anglican Communion with origins in and ongoing ties to the Church of England.
- + Welcome to Emmanuel Episcopal Church. We trace our history on Mercer Island to a first worship service in 1909 and to a prior church building, built in 1914, in an area of the island once known as East Seattle. We have met, worshiped, served at and gone forth in faith from the present church since 1959.
- + Welcome to Our Worship Today. The order for worship that we call the Holy Eucharist is printed, with music, on the following pages. It begins with the Liturgy of the Word: Bible readings, a sermon, an affirmation of faith, prayers, and greeting one another at the Peace. All this prepares us for the Eucharist itself the word is derived from the biblical Greek word for thanksgiving. Here and elsewhere it may also be called Holy Communion, the Lord's Supper or the Mass.
- + Welcome to Communion. The Real Presence of Christ in the blessed bread and wine is a primary belief in our Anglican tradition. Here at Emmanuel, any and all who are drawn to do so may receive Communion. Additional notes may be found at the appropriate place in today's printed order of worship.
- + Welcome to Getting Around Here.
- Our nursery and ministries with young children are offered in various ways at various times. Please inquire with an usher, the clergy or other parents, or look for information on our website.
- An accessible restroom may be found across from the stairway outside the west doors of the narthex (the gathering area just beyond the doors of the church proper). Other restrooms may be found up the ramp and stairs at the east side of the narthex.
- Hearing assistance devices, with related instructions, may be found in and borrowed from a basket on a narthex table.

WORSHIP & PASTORAL NOTES


Please share in welcoming as celebrant and preacher today the Rev. Dr. Frank Spina, Episcopal priest and Seattle Pacific University Professor Emeritus of Old Testament Studies. On his SPU profile webpage, Dr. Spina writes, "I love the life of the mind, intellectual stimulation, brac-ing academic arguments, the search for truth, the importance of logic and ration-ality, dealing with life's most significant questions, the interchange with young minds, and the opportunity to teach Christian Scripture and foster theological deliberation." He is already known to many at Emmanuel for the series of Sundays he served here in spring and summer 2024. Fr. Spina is leading worship here again today because I agreed to preach at the funeral of a former parishioner and longtime family friend in Chicago, yesterday, and Brooke and I have other family matters needing our attention there.

The gospel lessons for today and the next two Sundays are taken from chapters 20, 21 and 23 in Luke's gospel. These are confrontational and/or unsettling scenes from the last days of Jesus' earthly life – following his 'triumphal entry' into Jerusalem and anticipating his Passion and death. And then, we begin again ...

The First Sunday of Advent this year will be November 30. At the 10am service that day the choir will lead us in a traditional Advent Service of Lessons and Carols.





A READING FROM THE EPISTLES – 2 Thessalonians 2:1-5, 13-17

Lector A reading from the Second Letter of Paul to the Thessalonians.

As to the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and our being gathered together to him, we beg you, brothers and sisters, not to be quickly shaken in mind or alarmed, either by spirit or by word or by letter, as though from us, to the effect that the day of the Lord is already here. Let no one deceive you in any way; for that day will not come unless the rebellion comes first and the lawless one is revealed, the one destined for destruction. He opposes and exalts himself above every so-called god or object of worship, so that he takes his seat in the temple of God, declaring himself to be God. Do you not remember that I told you these things when I was still with you?

But we must always give thanks to God for you, brothers and sisters beloved by the Lord, because God chose you as the first fruits for salvation through sanctification by the Spirit and through belief in the truth. For this purpose he called you through our proclamation of the good news, so that you may obtain the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. So then, brothers and sisters, stand firm and hold fast to the traditions that you were taught by us, either by word of mouth or by our letter.

Now may our Lord Jesus Christ himself and God our Father, who loved us and through grace gave us eternal comfort and good hope, comfort your hearts and strengthen them in every good work and word.

THE HOLY GOSPEL - Luke 20:27-38

All standing, the Minister says to the People

The Lord be with you.

People And also with you.

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Savior Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Some Sadducees, those who say there is no resurrection, came to Jesus and asked him a question, "Teacher, Moses wrote for us that if a man's brother dies, leaving a wife but no children, the man shall marry the widow and raise up children for his brother. Now there were seven brothers; the first married, and died childless; then the second and the third married her, and so in the same way all seven died childless. Finally the woman also died. In the resurrection, therefore, whose wife will the woman be? For the seven had married her."


Jesus said to them, "Those who belong to this age marry and are given in marriage; but those who are considered worthy of a place in that age and in the resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. Indeed they cannot die anymore, because they are like angels and are children of God, being children of the resurrection. And the fact that the dead are raised Moses himself showed, in the story about the bush, where he speaks of the Lord as the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. Now he is God not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all of them are alive."

THE NICENE CREED

is worshiped and glorified,
who has spoken through the prophets.
We believe in one holy catholic and
apostolic Church.
We acknowledge one baptism
for the forgiveness of sins.
We look for the resurrection of the dead,
and the life of the world to come. Amen.

THE PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

The Intercessor begins: With all our heart and with all our mind, let us pray, saying "God, have mercy."

For the holy peace from above and the loving-kindness of God to be known in us and through us; for Archbishop-elect Sarah, for our Presiding Bishop Sean, our bishop Phil, and the people and clergy of this parish and diocese; and for the joy, unity and witness of the Church, here in this place and throughout the world:

Let us pray. God, have mercy.

For the integrity and wisdom of all who serve and lead, in our communities, in our state and nation, and throughout the world; for peace and greater mutual understanding wherever there is conflict: Let us pray. *God, have mercy*.

For the good earth which God has given us; for seasonable weather and for an abundance of the fruits of the earth; for our faithful stewardship of all creation and our wisdom and will to cherish and preserve it: Let us pray. *God, have mercy*.

For widows and orphans; for those without work or homes; for migrants and prisoners; for all who are vulnerable, in danger or fearful, and those who advocate and care for them: Let us pray. *God, have mercy.*

For those in need of healing or with other concerns who have asked for our prayers, including, and others known to us for whom we now pray aloud or silently. [Pause.]
Let us pray. God, have mercy.
For the faith, hope and delight of those celebrating birthdays today or in the coming week, including, and recalling as well, aloud or silently, our other thanksgivings. [Pause. Let us pray. God, have mercy.
For the dying; for all who have died in the hope of the resurrection; and for all the departed [including]: Let us pray. <i>God, have mercy</i> .

The Celebrant adds the following, or another Collect.

Heavenly Father, in you we live and move and have our being: We humbly pray you so to guide and govern us by your Holy Spirit, that in all the cares and occupations of our life we may not forget you, but may remember that we are ever walking in your sight; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen*.

THE CONFESSION

After a brief silence, the Celebrant says Let us confess our sins to God.

we confess that we have sinned against you,

We have denied your goodness in each other,

We repent of the evil that enslaves us,



Therefore, joining with Angels and Archangels and with all the faithful of every generation, we lift our voices with all creation as we sing:



Then the Celebrant continues

Blessed are you, gracious God, creator of the universe and giver of life. You formed us in your own image and called us to dwell in your infinite love.

You gave the world into our care that we might be your faithful stewards and show forth your bountiful grace. But we failed to honor your image in one another and in ourselves; we would not see your goodness in the world around us; and so we violated your creation, abused one another, and rejected your love. Yet you never ceased to care for us, and prepared the way of salvation for all people.

Through Abraham and Sarah you called us into covenant with you. You delivered us from slavery, sustained us in the wilderness, and raised up prophets to renew your promise of salvation. Then, in the fullness of time, you sent your eternal Word, made mortal flesh in Jesus. Born into the human family, and dwelling among us, he revealed your glory. Giving himself freely to death on the cross, he triumphed over evil, opening the way of freedom and life.

On the night before he died for us, Our Savior Jesus Christ took bread, and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his friends, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

As supper was ending, Jesus took the cup of wine, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said: "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is poured out for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The Celebrant continues

Remembering his death and resurrection, we now present to you from your creation this bread and this wine. By your Holy Spirit may they be for us the Body and Blood of our Savior Jesus Christ.

Grant that we who share these gifts may be filled with the Holy Spirit + and live as Christ's Body in the world. Bring us into the everlasting heritage of your daughters and sons, that with all your saints, past, present, and yet to come, we may praise your Name for ever.

Through Christ and with Christ and in Christ, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, to you be honor, glory, and praise, for ever and ever. AMEN.

And now as our savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

People and Celebrant

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses,

as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD

The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread. A period of silence is kept after which the Celebrant says


We break this bread and share this cup to share in the Body and Blood of Christ.

All are welcome to participate in communion at Emmanuel. Primarily our communion takes place at the altar rail. You can stand or kneel. If you want to abstain from the bread or wine, please cross your arms over your chest to receive a blessing. Gluten-free wafers are available. If the steps to the altar rail present a challenge for you, you may stand at the bottom of the stairs, or ask an usher to have communion brought to you in your seat.

Now send us forth in the power of your Spirit, that we may proclaim your redeeming love to the world in word and deed, and continue for ever in the risen life of Christ our Savior. Amen.
